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It's Bow Time!

Wrap up your Saint Patrick's decorating with some official Irish green from TLC CASA

Each March, and often a good bit sooner, Dublin's homes and businesses begin decking out in their bright green décor for Saint Patrick's Day. And for most of them, no set of Irish trimmings is complete without a green bow.

Ensure your office or dwelling looks the part this year by purchasing the official green ribbon of the Dublin Saint Patrick's Festival from TLC CASA, through its fundraiser, "Green Up for Saint Patrick's."

The organization, for years as the celebration's official provider, distributes bows in the hundreds that can be seen hung on signs, front doors, subdivision gateways, trees, lampposts and parade vehicles to celebrate the season.

The bows, which are carefully hand-tied by TLC CASA executive director Sherri Howard and staff, are available in small, medium and large sizes.

"We don't use a bow machine," said TLC CASA Advocacy Coordinator Marie Townsend.

Small bows are \$5, medium are \$10 and large are \$15. Larger bows, if needed, are also available on request.

Sales began in mid-February, at which point every year the organization has typically already received pre-orders from hundreds of annual buyers. They'll continue taking and filling those orders through Super

Saturday, March 16.

"We have our longstanding customers that are great supporters of ours, and have been for many years," Townsend said.

Delivery of bows is available for free on orders of \$10 or more. A fee will be charged for delivery on those orders of less than \$10, or to addresses a ways outside the Dublin city limits.

"We will actually hang the bows if needed," Townsend said.

TLC CASA, in its years of sponsoring this fundraiser, has never managed to keep track of the total number of bows sold in a given year without losing count. The fundraiser typically rolls out anywhere from several hundred to 1,000 per festival season.

As of press time on this preview, in mid-February, the organization had already brought in close to 200 orders. Townsend said the peak of bow season usually

comes just before the start of the festival, when they begin pouring in several dozen at a

The volume of bows that have to be tied and delivered throughout the festival requires a tremendous volunteer effort.

"It takes all of us to be able to make that happen," Townsend said. "We can't do it without our awesome volunteers that help us, and our staff. We all just pitch in."

Proceeds from the campaign benefit TLC CASA in its work to offer support services to abused and neglected children, and their families.

The organization, headquartered in Dublin, serves Laurens and 13 surrounding counties by providing "community-based advocacy that promotes safety and permanency for children who are victims of abuse and neglect" through trained volunteers that are appointed by juvenile court judges to focus legal proceedings on the bests interests of the children involved.

TLC CASA, a partnering agency with the Heart of Georgia United Way, offers a number of other resources for children and families involved in these cases, while promoting community awareness of these problems and solutions. It also provides a supervised visitation center that offers neutral, child-friendly facilities in which children can spend quality time with birth families, keeping them connected with siblings, parents and relatives who are often working toward goals of reunification.







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Irish flamingoes returning to local yards in second year of TLC CASA's 'You've Been Shamrocked' promotion

Spread some Saint Patrick's cheer, help out an important cause and get your neighbor's goat... er, flamingo... by taking part in a colorful TLC CASAsponsored fundraiser that is entering its second year.

The organization, last March, introduced Dublin-Laurens County the act of "Shamrocking" that is, spreading flocks of adorable cardboard flamingoes in the front yards of homes and businesses chosen by anonymous, or not-so-anonymous, donors.

lighthearted The shenanigan is a spin on a method popular fundraising known as "flocking," in which dozens of plastic pink flamingoes congregate around a designated residence or place of business for a period of time, with an invitation for owners to raise money or donate themselves to have the flock moved to another unsuspecting yard.

Dublin's version of the campaign involves custommade flamingoes that are dressed in green Saint Patrick's attire with top hats and orange beards, and benefits the work of TLC Children's Services, which trains and supports a local system of Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) in their service of abused and neglected chil-

The fundraiser returns for 2019 after hitting up likely 100 or more homes and establishments over a period of about three weeks in March, driven by strong participation and community response that TLC CASA Advocacy Coordinator Marie Townsend hopes to see again in a second year.

"Most people thought it was awesome that we were doing it," she said.

The promotion will begin this year with an earlier start date than its first, in which the groups of birds waited until the first week of March to descend upon the community. Organizers, this year, began dispatching the flamingoes well in advance of the Saint Patrick's festival. Shamrock-ings officially began Feb. 15, and are set to continue through Friday, March 22.

This year's edition of "You've Been Shamrocked" will follow a similar pattern, allowing participants

to "shamrock" a yard of his or her choice for a contribution of \$25. Within a few days, a group of flamingoes (the standard flock size is 12, though that number can enlarge to a super-flock for an additional charge) will then turn up in front of the home or business and remain for about a day before moving on to a new loca-

"Our goal is that they will fly onto their next yard or business in 24 hours," Townsend said. "They are welcome to keep it longer. They can add to the flock by making it larger if they would like. They can do a double flock if they want

Donors also have the option of letting the "victim" know who it was that placed the order, though they can elect to keep it a mystery too.

TLC CASA has up to six flocks, each a dozen birds strong, available to work with on a given day, Townsend said. She and her staff, with the help of volunteers, make rounds at least once a day during the

promotion to distribute the flocks and move them from yard to yard.

The team, when out and about, tries to be as secretive and stealthy as possible in its movements, though their efforts last year to sneak in and out of yards wasn't always suc-

'We got caught in a lot of yards," Townsend said.

The organization got a variety of reactions to the fundraiser, which had been done locally in various forms by other nonprofits in the past, though not on nearly as large a scale as

"People thought it was a cute idea," Townsend said. "Everybody played along and moved them up."

Some of the responses were quite interesting. One business, she said, picked up the flamingoes and took them back to the person who had flocked them.

"We even had somebody last year flock their own yard. They couldn't understand why they had to fly on, and we said, 'well, you're welcome to keep

Volunteers who help with the fundraiser, as well as its sister festival event "Green Up for Saint Patrick's," include mostly CASA volunteers and members of its partnering organization Friends of CASA.

"We all kind of pitch in and make sure it gets done," Townsend said.

The agency, which partners with Heart of Georgia United Way, is in need of volunteers to help not only in its Saint Patrick's fundraising efforts, but also to become CASA volun-

These individuals, who are trained and made available for appointment by juvenile court judges, are tasked with speaking up and out for abused and neglected children in court proceedings and the foster care system as their "eyes, ears and voice."

CASAs must be age 21 or older, and complete training provided by the local office either individually or as part of a semi-quarterly group training event.

"We train volunteers to be advocates for these children," Townsend said. "The model is every child that is in foster care has a volunteer advocate assigned to them to be their voice. All monies that are raised help our local program.'

There are a lot of faithful dog owners in this community, and this is a very small way they can participate in the event and give back to an organization that

does so much for our community."



Bunko mentality

Entering fourth year, Fancy **Dancer Booster Club's 'Luck** of the Irish Bunko' night still rolling large

A night of record attendance last year at Fancy Dancer Booster Club's "Luck of the Irish Bunko" convinced organizers and players that there's a lot of truth to the saying, "the bigger the better."

A crowd of 100 or more filled up a room at the OFTC DuBose Porter Center to spend an evening playing the traditional social dice game while enjoying refreshments and competing for prizes. And the night's fun and fellowship only seemed to grow with the participation numbers.

"Last year was our biggest year," said club president Cecelia Schenck. "We maxed out the room last year. It was packed. We had every seat filled."

Dublin-Laurens County's largest annual game of bunko convenes again for its fourth year as an official part of the Saint Patrick's Festival at 6 p.m. Monday, March 11. A Fancy Dancer Booster Club benefit, the event will be held again at OFTC.

One 2018's newcomers, it so happened, was Fancy Dancer owner and performing company director Abby Gilder McAllister, who couldn't make it in either of the first two years of the event since it fell on the same weeknight as classes and rehearsals back at the stu-

"I got to go last year, and it was the most fun I had had in a long time,'

McAllister was familiar with the game, having played it during small scale get-togethers at the homes of friends in the past, but had no idea that getting together with more than 100 folks to play as a large group

could be such a good time.

"A lot of bunko groups don't have that kind of crowd," she said. "There are so many tables that you never know who you'll end up with. I met a lot of people I knew in the community, although I didn't know them know them... You see people you haven't seen in years, and say, 'Oh my gosh, I'm glad you came. Thanks for supporting the girls.' You get to see new people and meet new people.'

The club, comprised mostly of parents whose daughters travel to regional competitions and festivals with the studio's performing company, introduced the event to the festival in 2016 when brainstorming outsidethe-box fundraisers, and in so doing, wound up starting a new tradition that's now developed its own faithful following.

"We've had several people (come) over the last few years, people who love doing things like playing bunko and things like that, once they know it's a regular activity," Schenck said. "I've had several people the last few years ask, every few years when it's about that time. They want to know are we doing it again and when they can get their tickets. We definitely have people that every year come back."

Doors will open at 6 p.m., and the game will get started once participants are able to find a seat and grab some refreshments, just after

members and booster club members. They are also available by calling Fancy Dancer at (478) 272-5832 or dropping by the studio at 803 Claxton Dairy Road.

Some tickets will be sold at the door, though that number is limited ultimately by room capacity, which is set based on pre-sales, so advance purchase of tickets is encouraged.

"We can only allow so many in the room, so we'll pre-sell, but once we have them at the door, we'll only be able to sell them until we've maxed out the room," Schenck said.

Bunko, if you're not familiar, is a parlor game with roots in Ireland that's almost as simple as rolling dice.

Players, seated around tables, are grouped in fours (teams of two seated across from one another) and pass around a set of dice to roll in turns. Points are scored, in six rounds per set, by rolling a number 1-6 that matches that of the round. Mark down a point for each die that rolls the round number. five for a mini-bunko (any three of a kind) and 21 for a bunko (three of a kind that match the round number). A player's turn lasts until he or she fails to score on a particular roll, and they then pass the dice on to their neighbor.

The round continues until the head table (of several dozen in the room) reaches a collective total of 21 points. At the close of each round,

the winning team at each table (which has the highest score in the round) remains seated while the losing team moves to a new table.

At the end of a game, which lasts between two and four sets of rounds, winners are decided by tallying wins, losses, mini-bunkos and bunkos.

Proceeds will benefit Fancy Dancer Booster Club, whose purpose in numerous vear-round fundraisers is helping its members cover the cost of travel to dance competitions and other events, as well as bringing in guest instructors to Dublin.

"It helps bring new people to Dublin," McAllister said. "We've had people from California, New York, all over, come in to teach these girls. But it also helps them travel outside of Dublin to get experiences in different places in the world of dance.'

The studio offers classes in ballet, tap, jazz, hip hop, pointe and tumbling, with jazz/contemporary and tap companies that perform locally and compete at conventions throughout the year.

"It really supports them in being able to attend the competitions so they can compete the dances that they work all year long to perfect, and to get as good as they can," Schenck said. "And they're able to go to other cities. We go to Orlando, Atlanta several times. It helps support them in being able to do those things."





Going Postal...

Service League's Mail Stamp 'post office-official' for 2019

A longtime Saint Patrick's event sponsored by Dublin Service League is getting an upgrade to first-class mail this year.

The organization's Mail Stamp, part of the festival for more than 20 years, has annually stationed DSL volunteers at Dublin's Bellevue Ave. post office and, more recently, at Mail and More on Hillcrest Parkway during Super Week to stamp a special Saint Patrick's greeting on outgoing mail.

These decorations, which over the years featured the festival emblem, a dancing leprechaun and a shamrock, among other things, were offered to be pressed in green ink on the front or back of envelopes before they were dropped in the outgoing mail slot for routine processing.

This year, for the first time ever, the U.S. Postal Service is allowing Dublin Service League to handcancel those pieces of mail by applying the actual wavy postmark you see on top of postage at the top right hand corner of envelopes upon delivery. For the week of the event March 11-15, customers at both establishments will have the option of dropping off their post at the DSL table to receive a special Irish treatment as it's sent for processing.

Instead of the standard black imprint, these letters will be stamped – likely in green ink – with a Saint Patrick's Festival-specific design that features imagery unique to Dublin, along with the date and zip code.

"We used to just stamp anywhere on the envelope, and it was just a stamp," said DSL member and Mail and More owner Audrey Hogan. "This is actually post office-official."

The event, as in previous years, will take place DUBLIN SERVICE LEAGUE SAINT PATRICK'S MAIL STAMP

during operating hours at both establishments Monday, March 11 through Friday, March 15. The two locations (Mail and More at 1104-L Hillcrest Parkway and the post office at 514 Bellevue Ave.) will have a table staffed by service leaguers set up just inside the door, where customers need only drop off their outgoing letters instead of taking them to the counter or an outgoing mail slot.

Mail and More is open 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. weekdays, while the Bellevue Post Office operates from 8:30 a.m. until 4:45

Just how the Saint Patrick's postmark will look is still being worked out between organizers, the postal service, the city and the Saint Patrick's Festival Committee, though odds are it will feature either imagery of Saint Patrick's day, the Dublin festival or the city's seal.

The regular decorative stamps will also be available, as in previous years, to dress up other parts of envelopes, should anyone choose to add a little extra Irish to their mail.

Letters mailed out of Dublin during the week of the event, each year, can take a little of the Emerald City's Saint Patrick's experience with them en route to places near and far. For years, and now in a new way, the Mail Stamp is helping get just a bit of that Irish cheer to those in other places.

"It's kind of a neat way to spread the word about how big a festival we have," Hogan said.

Kight said he hopes for a large turnout this year but, "We never know. We may have one or two show up, or we may have 50. We just don't ever know. I always look forward to this time of year."

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
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Irish Balloon Fest launching several new features in 16th year

An annual balloon festival has been part of Dublin's Saint Patrick's celebration for 15 years. And in that timespan, the event's new organizer, Patrick Thames, can't remember any point at which a shamrock-shaped hot air balloon ever participated in the event.

There's a first time for everything.

The 2019 edition of the Irish Balloon Fest, in which more than a dozen balloon crews will spend a weekend flying out of Southern Pines Regional Park, is expected to welcome a specialty balloon shaped as a bright green clover to its array of traditional airships that will take part in the two-day jamboree March 8-9, Thames said.

The first-year balloon chair on the Saint Patrick's Festival Committee, which sponsors the yearly festival, said that 18 balloon crews are expected to converge on the park for the weekend to take part in the event and its range of activities.

Of these balloon teams, which hail from states including Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina and Alabama, there are three types:

First are sport pilots, which fly traditionally-shaped balloons for general purposes. These teams travel to fly at festivals and events like this across the state and region, offering rides to ordinary passengers.

Second are so-called corporate balloons, which bear the promotional image of a company or cause and are flown by those organizations as a means of advertisement. ReMax, a real-estate company whose logo features a hot air balloon, is perhaps the most notable corporate balloon and a regular attender

of the Irish Balloon Fest. Another one set to be a part of this year's festival promotes the 811 campaign – ironically a public-service announcement advising contractors and gardeners on the ground to "know what's below" before digging.

Third are specialty balloons, which come in odd shapes and sizes. They can resemble anything from a bird or wine bottle to Smokey Bear and Jedi Master Yoda. The Irish-specific shamrock balloon set to visit this year's festival will be Dublin's first specialty craft in a while.

"I know we've had a dog before, but that's been a long time," Thames said.

It won't be the only new addition to the 2019 festival, which will include its typical schedule of morning and afternoon launches as well as the twilight "balloon glows" on Friday and Saturday.

Friday's opening night of festivities, this year, will feature a screening of the movie "UP" by Disney-Pixar, sponsored by the Dublin-Laurens County Recreation Authority. The animated film, a 2009 release about an adventure by an elderly man who flies with a young stowaway into the southern hemisphere by attaching thousands of heli-

um balloons to his house, will be shown on a 30-foot outdoor screen as the glowing balloons in the distance begin to deflate and pack up after sunset.

Both Friday and Saturday night's glow will feature a range of on-site food and drink vendors, carnival rides and inflatable games furnished by locally-based DM's Jumping Gyms. Joining that lineup of activities on Saturday will be live music by Free Spirits Orchestra.

A yet-to-be-determined number of balloonists will also offer tethered rides during the twilight activities on both nights, if the weather allows.

Balloon crews are slated to launch for full-scale flights on Friday afternoon, Saturday morning and then Saturday afternoon. These takeoffs, scheduled for roughly an hour after sunrise and several hours prior to sunset, will see almost all of the balloons rise from the park and scatter wherever the wind takes them across the county, where many land in the middle of fields and residential neighborhoods.

These flights are tentatively set for 4 p.m. Friday, as early as 7 a.m. Saturday morning and as early as 4:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon. But

record those times can change based on the weather, as well as on

how quickly pilots manage or

care to have their balloons up

and ready to fly.

"Weather can push it back
an hour," Thames said. "It
just depends on what the
weather does."

All events, in fact, are weather-contingent, as the balloons require ideal wind conditions to fly whether anchored to the ground or launching into the open sky. The festival's peripheral activities may not be affected by high winds, but are potentially subject to rainout.

Thames, who is in his first year as the festival's balloon chair, took his first flight in the gondola of a balloon that launched from Southern Pines last year.

"It was amazing," he said.
"It was so peaceful. You felt
like you were standing still
and the world was passing
beneath you. It's definitely a
unique view of Dublin."

Equally breathtaking is the view of balloons, illumined by their burners, against the dusk at each evening's balloon glow, where spectators are welcomed to gaze from afar or

walk beneath the balloons and interact with their handlers.

Free Spirits Orchestra, which will provide its "eclectic" brand of music as a soundtrack to the spectacular light show this year, is a three-piece band that plays instrumental versions of a wide variety of music.

The group features a pair of violinists native to Kazakhstan in twin sisters Aiman and Sholpan Beybitbaeva, who have played violin since age 7 and were classically trained at their home country's Republic Music School and Kurmangazy Kazakh Conservatory. National Backing the duo is percussionist Butch Braddy, a Georgia (of the U.S.) native who met the two sisters while playing a gig at a Savannah night club. The three combined to form the group, and now tour around the state playing special events and concerts.

Their repertoire covers every style of music from pop, jazz and big-band hits to international and cultural selections. This fusion combines worldwide music like the Argentine Tango, Irish Jig, Mexican Mariachi and Salsa and Russian love songs with well-known rock and roll, country and blues hits from Ray Charles, Willie Nelson, Led Zeppelin, Radiohead and Coldplay.

Thames, who works at Bank of Dudley, connected with the group when it played at the bank's Christmas party in December, and approached them about playing at the Irish Balloon Fest.

The addition of their live music, along with Friday night's movie, will combine with the large number of participating balloon crews to make the 16th-annual festival one of Dublin's largest vet.

"I think 18 will be the most we've ever had," Thames said. "And that really puts us on par with some of the balloon festivals in larger communities."



The concert will take place in the church's sanctuary, which Wilson said seats around 200. Doors will open by 6:30 p.m. at the latest, with the con-





Munchies back, bigger for 2019

After a several-year absence, and a successful reintroduction to the community during last year's festival, the Munchies are back on the local Saint Patrick's menu once again.

Find something, or several things, for each member of your family to feast on from a large selection of local vendors who'll be selling their food and beverages at the Stubbs Park event from 6 to 9 p.m. March 16.

The longtime tradition, with its tastes and smells all too familiar to Super Saturday event-goers, was welcomed back with open utensils when it returned to the local Saint Patrick's spread a year ago.

Held for years downtown until its discontinuation in the late 2000s, the Munchies was revived and re-imagined by a team of organizers who served up a new and modernized version of the popular event in a new location: Stubbs Park. Its comeback, by popular demand, owed to the work of Munchies creator and longtime facilitator Kathy Jones, who joined with former festival chair Jeff Cannon to set up the event as a side dish to Visit Dublin's ShamROCK concert at Stubbs Park.

Even before the date arrived last March, both could sense in the widespread buzz across the community a hunger to see the event held again on a

yearly basis.

"The most exciting thing was everybody seemed really excited about bringing back the Munchies," Jones said. "It enjoys a wonderful reputation from years past. I think they were excited to see we were bringing back an old favorite, if you will."

The duo, in 2018, cooked up only a small serving that gave Dublin a mere taste of the event's heyday. The first-year pilot was purposely scaled down, including just three vendors, to ensure community interest was sufficient for a full-scale comeback.

The response, it would turn out, was all they had hoped for, and more.

"Several restaurants sold out quickly," Jones said. "People were asking if there were more vendors. That let us know that people were excited about it being back."

In year two, plans are to kick things up a notch, and bite off a bigger chunk of vendors. Six, as of press time for this preview in mid-February, had already signed up to participate. Jones and Cannon are actively recruiting more of them to join up by March

The 2019 Munchies will again piggy-back on the open-air ShamROCK concert and three full courses of live music beginning at 4 p.m. from the park's amphitheater nearby. Vendors will begin dishing out the food at 6 p.m. in the section of the park closest to the

Though small in size for its first year back as part of the festival, the

back as part of the festival, the rebooted Munchies drew a hearty crowd to Stubbs Park in 2018. This year's edition will more than double in size as organizers welcome a handful of new vendors to the event /CLAY REYNOLDS

corner of Park Place and South Drive just across the stream from the live music.

The concert is free, though the Munchies portion of the event, this year, will carry a \$5 per person admission charge. That cost includes \$2 in tokens, redeemable for items served by individual vendors. Additional tokens, which represent \$1 in currency each, can be purchased separate-

"We have ticket booths at the entrances, so you can go ahead and buy tokens when you first get there," Jones said. "There's no money exchanged (with the vendors). It's all tokens. That keeps everything safe."

Picnic tables will also available for sit-down dining.

Munchies vendors, as in years past, will be 100 percent local, representing area restaurants, churches, clubs, nonprofits and oth-

ers who each bring something unique to the table.

"We're different from the Arts and Crafts food vendors, because we want hometown people to be a part of the Munchies,' Jones said. "I want the local restaurants, caterers, the Boy Scout troops, the church youth group, the local clubs, service clubs. We want vou to come sell vour food, cook your food, whatever, and then the money you raise goes back into our community. I think that's what makes us different."

Many local restaurants who sponsor booths choose to make their food offerings in-house and bring to the park to sell, while others will prepare everything onlocation. Electrical hookups are available for any vendor needing power for appliances.

If you're interested in becoming a vendor, contact Jones by calling (478) 484-5032.

"We're hoping to fill up the whole park with vendors," she said. "Anybody, a group, organization or restaurant, who wants to call me, I'll be glad to talk to them about how it all works. It's a great fundraiser for your group, and it's also a lot of fun."

Jones added a word of appreciation for Cannon, who was instrumental in the success of last year's event and is returning as co-organizer.


"I'm blessed to have him working with me," she said.

"It's a pretty big undertaking, so it's nice to have a great partner. He's a former (Saint Patrick's Festival) chairman, and he's as excited as I am about the event."

Last year's experience, for them and the several hundred who made their way out to the park to enjoy a bite to eat and hear some live music, called back images of the food, fellowship and fun that always made the Munchies a Saint Patrick's favorite, and appear to be doing so once again.

When the great singer/songwriter Tom Petty wrote that "the good old days may not return," he clearly hadn't visited Dublin on a Super Saturday.

"They love that it's a family event," Jones said. "You can bring your children and babies in strollers. It was just fun reminiscing about the way it used to be."







Zampa, Barlow, The Woofs headline expanded ShamROCK at Stubbs

Super Saturday festivities made their return to a revitalized Stubbs Park two years ago with the debut of an open-air concert entitled ShamROCK.

Envisioned as a way for music-lovers to close out the Saint Patrick's Festival's biggest day with a bang, the event has grown in size with each successive year by booking more performers, drawing larger crowds and recruiting a partner event in the Munchies, which had the park buzzing with activity as it set up shop for the first time last year.

A larger-than-ever lineup of live music will take the stage as the free concert expands its time frame for 2019. ShamROCK, which will kick off at the new time of 4 p.m. Saturday, March 16, is set to welcome three different Middle Georgia music acts that will play a musical finale to the day's many activities.

"It's going to be pretty awesome," said Rebecca McWilliam Johnson, CEO of event sponsor Visit Dublin. "It's going to kind of build up throughout the evening.'

The evening's three stanzas will feature groups with roots in the midstate, each of

them former DubJam participants who are no stranger to the Stubbs Park stage.

The show will be led off at 4 p.m. by musician and storyteller Bob Zampa, who portrays southern culture through words and music in an acoustic, laid-back style.

"He's a pretty cool guy," Johnson said. "He combines folk music with the art of storytelling.

A local trio led by Dublinbased saxophonist Curtis Barlow will take the stage next, shifting gears to a smooth blend of contemporary jazz, R&B and gospel, with some country, dance tunes and rock and roll sprinkled in.

"Curtis is just phenomenal," Johnson said. "He's played previously at two DubJams, and just brings that artistic flair with him.'

Closing out the night, and headlining the evening's show, is The Woofs. The four-piece psychedel-

ic rock band, out of Milledgeville, describes itself as "funkadelic" and "journey through the sound waves," and plays a unique combination of classic rock, jazz, soul, funk and more.

"The Woofs were supposed to play for us last year at DubJam, and they got rained out, unfortunately, so we were able to bring them back for ShamROCK, which we were super happy about,' Johnson said. "They're an awesome band and we were all very sad that we missed them last year."

The timing of the different portions of the concert will be fluid, Johnson said, with the next group taking the stage when the act before

them has wrapped up. The entire concert is expected to run until sometime between 9 and 10 p.m., or however long it takes the show's final act to finish its closing set.

Blankets and lawn chairs are welcome in all areas of the park, where limited bench seating is available in the amphitheater area.

ShamROCK, now in its third year, has hosted Washington County's Sunbelt Revolution as a headline act in 2017 and 2018, with Swainsboro's Rachel Carter as an opener last year.

For 2019, Johnson and fellow organizers opted to change things up and book a trio of performers familiar to Dublin, though brand new to the Saint Patrick's scene. The added talent made it necessary to move up the event's start time a couple hours. That decision – strategic as much as it was a matter of convenience - also hopes to build on incremental increases in attendance the first two years by drawing in traffic already lingering in the downtown area from Super Saturday events taking place earlier in the day as they begin to wind

"As people are pulling out of the Arts & Crafts Festival, we wanted to kind of give them another organic flow to another event that was close by downtown," Johnson said.

Even greater crowds are expected in the second year of the Munchies, which made their return in the park as a connected event last year, and aided in bringing the concert its best draw

"We're very happy that the Munchies is a partner with us again this year,' Johnson said. "And it's going to be even bigger and better than it was last year."

Plenty of catchy tunes and some of the best in local cuisine, all in one spot, figure to make Stubbs Park a destination on the end of the Super Saturday itinerary for plenty of locals and guests hoping to finish up their day of Saint Patrick's celebration with a good time.

"We're just looking forward to it," Johnson said.

Shop unique crafts, good food and more at Arts and Crafts Festival

A section of Downtown Dublin will transform into an open-air bazaar and become the nucleus of Super Saturday for a period of several hours as the Market on Madison and Bicentennial Plaza host Dublin's annual Saint Patrick's Arts and Crafts Festival March 16.

One of Dublin's longestrunning festival events annually draws 100 or more merchants and an estimated 10,000 people to the downtown area to shop the oneof-a-kind selection of handmade items while enjoying a variety of food, treats and entertaining activities.

Admission is free to the Saint Patrick's Committee and City of Dublin-sponsored festival, which will run from 9 a.m. through 6 p.m.

The all-day event, in recent years, has averaged between 70 and 80 craft vendors, according to Downtown Development Authority Executive Director Tara Bradshaw.

Shoppers can make any number of surprising finds while navigating booths spread out at all corners of the several-acre area, where artisan jewelry, woodwork, handmade clothing, various trinkets and interesting artwork are among the number of unique items available. Many merchants will also offer edibles like local honeys, gourmet fudge, homemade jams and jellies and baked goods.

"Our committee focuses on having good, quality craft vendors," Bradshaw said. "Things you wouldn't normally see when you visit a store or a shop somewhere. We focus on those handmade crafts and unique retail items."

The festival also brings in each year, on average, 20-30 more food and beverage vendors, based from stands, tents and food trucks and serving up everything from fair-style concessions to ethnic foods. Satisfy your appetite at lunch, dinner, snacktime or dessert with hot dogs and burgers off the grill, pork on a stick, funnel cakes and popcorn, pork rinds and blooming onions. Polish it off with a handsqueezed lemonade, slushy, snow cone or a dip of ice

A handful of operators will also be on-site running amusement attractions like rock-climbing walls, bungee jumping sets, carnival rides

and inflatable games. The market stage will also feature live music and other entertainment for most of the

day.

Bradshaw could not provide at press time the full list of expected acts, many who were still unconfirmed, but said that locally-based dancers from Georgia Dance Explosion's clogging company and G-Rhythm Performing Arts Center were among those already booked.

"We do have a couple bands that we're working on, but there'll be some acoustic music and singing," she said.

A portion of each year's food and craft vendors are local artisans, though a majority that visit the festival hail from outside the midstate, and are craftsmen who enjoy traveling regionally and sometimes nationwide to sell their wares at similar festivals across the country.

"We have vendors coming from all the way from North Carolina to Florida," Bradshaw said. "There are a lot of regional vendors coming from Warner Robins to Vidalia, and then we have a great deal of vendors from Metro Atlanta and mountain areas this year. It's a really good representation of Georgia craft vendors."

Over the years, Dublin's Arts and Crafts Festival has become one that many vendors make a point of attending on a yearly basis.

"Most of our craft and food vendors have a circuit that they travel throughout the year," Bradshaw said. "Our festival usually marks their first for the calendar year. January and February, typically, are very slow months for festivals. Most of our vendors kick off a very busy year of festival travel with Dublin. They always have it circled and look forward to each year."

The festival, she added, is usually a successful one for the merchants who do make their way to the Emerald City for the Saint Patrick's weekend.

"We changed it up a few years ago, and our committee got rid of gate admission," Bradshaw said. "One of those thoughts was we hoped the people who come will support the vendors. We've seen the last five years that they really do."

The area of the market and Bicentennial Plaza, bordered by Jackson, Church and Monroe Streets and crossing a closed block of Madison, will become an alcohol-, drug- and gun-free zone during the hours of the festival

festival,
Law enforcement officers,
representing the Dublin Police Department, Laurens
County Sheriff's Office and
Georgia State Patrol, will also maintain a visible presence throughout the area

and at entrances.

Bradshaw added that streets immediately surrounding the area will begin closing for setup Friday at 12 p.m. Vendor check-in will take place near First African Baptist Church.

The event runs smoothly thanks to several groups of volunteers from clubs at local schools, scout troops, city departments and the DDA that give their time to help with all aspects of the operation from vendor setup to litter control throughout the day.

Public works crews, from the city, get to work as early as the Thursday before each year's event running temporary water lines, erecting fences and supplying power to vendor booths.

"They're always the rock stars that are behind the scenes, and publicly we need to thank them over and over again," Bradshaw said. "We really are glad that the festival committee lets us partner with them to make sure this goes off without a hitch. I would say it's a collaborative effort on everyone's part that is involved. It couldn't

take place without any one

of us."

For families who migrate downtown at mid-morning for the lunchtime parade, the Arts and Crafts Festival offers a great afternoon activity, complete with food, in "a full day of celebration."
